EDUCATIONAL GOALS

This is a course about being a Clinical Psychologist. We will look at the historical development of the profession, at the various therapeutic approaches and the Ethical and Legal environment of the profession. This will help you understand Psychology if you need to see a therapist, or what you are getting yourself in for if you decide you want to do that as a profession.

Assessment

Psychotherapy

Forensic

Have a better idea of what you want to be when you grow up (professionally).

PREREQUISITE SKILLS

PSY1213 Introduction to Psychology. Although you may have been admitted without this prerequisite, an appreciation of psychological thinking will be required to pass the course. If you have not taken the Introduction to Psychology course, you should plan on spending more time in preparation for each week's discussions.



INSTRUCTIONAL METHODS AND COURSE ORGANIZATION

As this course is fully online you will need to be adequately motivated to seek out the materials to study. Course materials will be on Blackboard.

Blackboard Learning Environment – Blackboard at my.ltu.edu contains the syllabus, all assignments, reading materials, narrated PowerPoint mini-lectures, chapter quizzes, and discussion forums. You will submit all assignments via Blackboard, and are expected to participate regularly in discussion topics. Please take time to familiarize yourself with the organization of the Blackboard site. You will want to check the site frequently for announcements reminding you of new resources and upcoming assignments.

Student/Instructor Conversations – Students keep in touch with the instructor via the Bb discussion board, or e-mail messages.

Required Reading – Textbook chapters should be read according to the schedule outlined below. Chapters will be discussed online.

Assignments – Each week there is a reading assignment (usually a chapter from the book, but there is one additional reading assignment that is on Bb for module 13. Each week there will be a chapter test or a brief paper required. These are listed in the Course Schedule section of the Syllabus. Each week there will be discussions via the Bb discussion board. The discussions are a very important part of the course as they are the only way we have of building a learning community. Grading of your participation in the discussions will be both the quantity and quality of your comments. "Me too" type comments, while welcome, will not enhance your grade. There is one final paper in lieu of a final exam. Yeah, it is a lot of work, but it beats cramming for an exam.

CLASS POLICIES AND EXPECTATIONS

I plan to offer you a valuable learning experience, and expect us to work together to achieve this goal. Here are some general expectations regarding this course:

Each student has a LTU email account. If you wish to use a different email address for this course, please **change your email address in Blackboard under "Blackboard Tools", then "Personal Information"** and send an email to me so I can store your address in my email directory.

Readings, discussion forum participation, and written assignments must be completed according to the class schedule. If business travel will take you away from regular participation, please clear the dates with me in advance.

It is essential that all students actively contribute to the course objectives through their experiences and working knowledge and share their thoughts and experiences in the discussion boards.

All assignments must be submitted on schedule, via Blackboard, and using Microsoft Office compatible software in .doc or .rtf formats. If you do not have Microsoft Word or just hate Microsoft, a viable free alternative is Open office. (www.OpenOffice.org) If you need to submit an assignment via email, contact the instructor in advance. Late work will be reduced in value.

Assignments must be completed to an adequate standard to obtain a passing grade. Requirements for each assignment are detailed in this syllabus.

Be prepared to log into Blackboard at least once each day. Please focus your online correspondence within the appropriate Blackboard discussion forums so that your colleagues can learn from you.



At midterm and at the end of the course, you will be invited to participate in a University evaluation of this course. Your feedback is important to the University, to LTU Online, and to me as an instructor, and I encourage you to participate in the evaluation process.

It is important for you as students to know what to expect from me as your instructor:

- I will be available to you via e-mail and phone, and will promptly reply to your messages.
- I will be available to you for face-to-face appointments as requested in Lansing.
- I will maintain the Blackboard web site with current materials, and will resolve any content-related problems promptly as they are reported to me.
- I will return all assignments to you promptly, and will include individualized comments and suggestions with each assignment.

1. Plagiarism

The term "PLAGIARISM" includes but is not limited to (a) the use, by paraphrase or direct quotation, of the published or unpublished work or creative and/or intellectual property in print, product, or digital media of another person without full and clear acknowledgment; (b) the unacknowledged use of materials prepared by another person or agency engaged in the selling of term papers, reports, or other academic materials; or (c) the appropriating, buying, receiving as a gift, or obtaining by any other means another person's work and the unacknowledged submission or incorporation of it in one's own work. Plagiarism is unethical, since it deprives the true author of his/her rightful credit and then gives that credit to someone to whom it is not due. Examples include:

- Quoting, paraphrasing, or summarizing written material, even a few phrases, without acknowledgment.
- Failing to acknowledge the source of either a major idea or an ordering principle central to one's own paper.
- Relying on another person's data, evidence, or critical method without credit or permission.
- Submitting another person's work as one's own.
- Using unacknowledged research sources gathered by someone else.
- Copying portions or outcomes of two- or three-dimensional creative property of previously published work.
- Copying items from Internet websites without acknowledgment of the source.

SafeAssign(tm) will check all submitted papers against the internet, a reference library, and all papers previously submitted to SafeAssign. If you have plagiarized, very bad things will



happen. At best, a 0 on the assignment and referral to the Department Chair/Dean. At worst, expulsion from the University.

PRACTICAL GUIDELINES FOR CLASS LOAD EXPECTATIONS

A three-credit course generally requires <u>at least</u> nine hours per week of time commitment. Here are some practical guidelines to help schedule your time commitments for this online course:

 A 14-week semester (the Summer semester is compressed into 10 weeks) would require at least 126 hours of time commitment to successfully complete all readings, activities, assignments, and texts as described in this syllabus.

These guidelines may not reflect the actual amount of outside time that you – as a unique individual with your own learning style – will need to complete the course requirements. The number of hours each week will vary based on assignment due dates, so please plan ahead to insure that you schedule your academic, work, and personal time effectively.

I would suggest: Read the book Sunday/Monday, enter the discussion on Tuesday and keep up with it through Sunday. Take the test/write the paper on Sunday. Start the next module on Monday.

Don't get behind, points will be deducted for tests completed after midnight Sunday and you will get no points for discussion comments after Sunday midnight because I won't even check that module's discussion boards after that.

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Details for all assignments are shown below. Please note that you should not submit any assignments to the Blackboard "Digital Drop Box." All assignments are submitted using the Blackboard "Assignments" or "SafeAssign" function. Some assignments are also posted to the Blackboard Discussion Forum for student comments.

Assignment: Brief Paper

Overview – A brief paper is NOT a research paper. It should not be in APA format. When I ask for a brief paper I want your <u>informed</u> thoughts on the subject. Not your <u>uninformed</u> thoughts, the paper should reflect the reading you have done, the content of the lectures and your thoughts on the subject.

A good brief paper will have a few paragraphs that summarize the material from the book and the lectures and then several paragraphs that comment on the material, from your point of view.

Brief Papers will be evaluated as follows:

50% - how well does the paper reflect the material from the chapter and lectures?

30% - how well does the student integrate the material with his/her own thoughts on the subjects

20% - how much original thought is reflected in the paper?

Please Note: agreeing with the instructor gets you no points. A thoughtful critique that disagrees with the instructor/book is just a welcome as a thoughtful critique that agrees.

All papers, brief or final, will be uploaded via SafeAssign. SafeAssign automagically checks the paper against the world wide web, looking for similarities. So, don't even think about cutting and pasting from anything you find on the web. It also checks the papers against other papers submitted, currently or in the past for this course, so don't recycle your friend's paper either. See the plagiarism note, above.

Assignment: Discussion forum

Overview – Building a learning community is difficult in a fully online course, but is quite rewarding when we achieve it. The only tool we have is the discussion forum on Bb. Please review the discussion boards early in the week as some discussion boards will be designed to elicit your thoughts BEFORE you read the material and will close early in the week. Other discussion boards will be to discuss the material from the book or the online lectures.

Quantity and Quality of your online posts will contribute to your grade. The discussion boards are a very important (25%) part of your grade. Generally I compute the grade for each week's contributions by just counting the number of posts that add to the discussion. I generally give little credit for "me too" type posts and do give extra credit for insightful posts that greatly add to the discussion.

How much to divulge about yourself is always an issue, especially in a psychology course. No, we don't want to know about the **content** of your psychotherapy, that is between you and your therapist.

No, we don't want to know about your childhood traumata, that is between you and your therapist. Yes, we do want to share your experiences with psychologists, even ones you have seen professionally, *if it is relevant to the subject being discussed*. Assignment: Chapter Tests

The Chapter tests will comprise a number of questions including multiple choice, multiple answer, matching, fill in the blanks, short answer and, occasionally, brief essay.
