Educational Goals

The purpose of this course is to provide an overview of the alternative construction processes used in commercial construction and a deeper understanding of the differences and similarities between them.

A brief video overview of this course is available in Module 0 in the Course Schedule.

Objectives

Comprehensive study of construction management services, including project planning, scheduling, budgeting, contract administration and agreements. Comparison between traditional construction delivery systems and the commonly used fast tracking and phasing of construction projects.

Prerequisite Skills

Attentive listening and graduate level written skills.

Instructional Methods and Course Organization

Blackboard learning environment – Blackboard at <u>my.ltu.edu</u> contains the syllabus, all assignments, reading materials, streaming videos, narrated Powerpoint mini-lectures, links to Web resources, and discussion forums. You will submit all assignments via Blackboard, and are expected to participate regularly in discussion topics. Please take time to familiarize yourself with the organization of the Blackboard site. You will want to check the site frequently for announcements reminding you of new resources and upcoming assignments. You are advised to check Blackboard on a daily basis. **Student/Instructor Conversations –** Students keep in touch with the instructor primarily via e-mail messages and occasional telephone calls.

Assignments – There will be three written assignment during the course. They are expected to be of a prescribed length, usually brief, and are expected to thoroughly and accurately respond to the subject. The assignments will be posted at intervals throughout the semester and a specific completion and submittal date will be noted. Correct grammar and punctuation are expected.

Assignment Details

All assignments shall be submitted to the Assignments folder in the Content Areas. Assignments 1, 2 and 3 (30, 45 and 75 points respectively)

Overview - Specific instructions regarding the assignment will be made available during the course.

Organization and overall writing quality – 12 points Use of citations from trade or academic journals with proper use of APA citation formatting – 3 points Overall critical thinking – 15, 30 and 60 points respectively

Critical thinking is important and expected of students. Critical thinking means interpreting and using the information delivered in the course to form meaningful delivery. Simply feeding back the delivered material and quoting it does not constitute a critical thinking response. Any questions regarding the expectation should be raised before the first written assignment is turned in.

Online Participation (75 points) (5 Discussion Threads)

Each student is expected to actively participate in online activities. **Class participation is evaluated to a maximum of 75 points** based on actively participating in Blackboard discussion forums, responding to questions posted by the instructor, and interacting positively with other students.

For each discussion thread: **Minimum of 3 contributions to the discussion on each discussion thread – 5 points Discussion over entire period – 2 points** Proper grammar – 3 points Quality content – 5 points Note: For example, three contributions on the last day or two of the posting interval would be viewed as one contribution. Also, simply saying that you agree with something said is not a contribution.
