STUDENT LEARNING OBJECTIVES / OUTCOMES

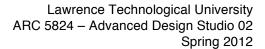
To understand that successful design encompasses a breadth of disciplines and connects people on a variety social/political/environmental/and economic levels.

INSTRUCTIONAL METHODS AND COURSE ORGANIZATION

Weekly lectures / Live classroom sessions in which we discuss a variety of topics centered around Humanism, Urbanism, and Environmentalism. Weekly individual 'Desk-Crits' to discuss issues/topics specifically related to the particular student's area of interest and study.

All assignments must be submitted on schedule, via email.

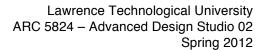
NO LATE ASSIGNMENTS WILL BE ACCEPTED OR GRADED
